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### **EDITORIAL**

School holidays should be about dodging kids on bikes and skateboards but these days it's more about getting them out of the house and off their phones and gaming machines.

The federal government's ban on social media for under-16s comes into effect in December so now is a good time to start weaning youngsters off their dopamine fix.

Mobile phones activate the brain's reward system, which releases dopamine, a neurotransmitter, especially through social media, games, and notifications. This creates a cycle of seeking dopamine hits, leading to increased usage and a temporary mood boost followed by a letdown.

Overstimulation can deregulate the brain's dopamine production, potentially causing feelings of anxiety and low motivation, similar to symptoms seen in drug addiction.

While it might not seem like it when you're dealing with withdrawal symptoms, ie. tantrums, restricting the use of phones will be doing your children a favour. Over-use of technology leads to poor attention span, eyesight issues, hand problems and bad posture. Let alone the pressure of getting Likes and what the bullies do to mess with their heads.

That overstimulation also causes sleep issues which, in turn, leads parents to seek other solutions.

In a dramatic spike, the Australian Poisons Hotline received a record 1500 calls about children ingesting melatonin last year, with an increasing number of parents using melatonin to help their children sleep, either as a prescription or purchased online, sometimes in the form of gummies.

We really are doing our best to screw up our kids.

Kentish House is addressing the vitally important need to divert our children to other activities, away from their phones, back to the real world. Fun things on offer these school holidays include cake decorating, bleach art and painting along with other activities designed for differing age levels.

Another idea it to encourage children to take pride in their community by joining Clean Up events or organising one in their own patch. Maybe start with their room!

Working parents don't have as many options to divert their youngsters to more social activities so it is essential that the Village steps in to raise a child. If extended families aren't around or available, be a friend and offer to take them with you on whatever exciting, outdoor, social, technology-free adventure you have planned.

And be the model. Us adults use our phones way too much and are terrible examples for our children.

# XPrize judges test drones at nan's farm

From hundreds of entrants across the globe, Taz Drones and its partners have made it to the final 15 in the international XPrize competition, which seeks to end destructive wildfires through early detection and suppression.

This global competition challenges innovators to develop fully autonomous systems that detect and suppress destructive wildfires, can operate in remote, high-risk environments without direct human control, and adapt to real-world conditions in real time.

Judges from Alaska, the UK and America recently visited Sheffield for three days for in situ testing, with Taz Drones achieving 98 per cent accuracy.

The sovereign manufactured drones were put to the test, lifting massive buckets of water and hitting a 2x2m target pad on the ground. "We took them to nan's farm in West Kentish and we did it, we proved to them that we could do it," said Taz Drone Solutions founder and director Andrew Davies.

"We also put out a fire five or six times, putting our systems to the test. As the only finalists from the southern hemisphere in the XPrize wildfire competition, we were super proud to host the judges in our hometown Sheffield."

Taz Drone Solutions is part of the Fire Foresight team, which includes Hobart-based Indicium Dynamics, working to develop an integrated system that uses a combination of sensors, drones, and AI to provide real-time wildfire intelligence and rapid response. The team has already received US\$30,000 from the XPrize Board for reaching the finals.

Andrew said the goal of the competition was to fund and

incentivise individual companies through a large cash prize to create technologies which identify and contain wildfires within 10 minutes. "It is a multi-trillion dollar problem," he said.

Taz Drones began working with Tasmanian Parks and Wildlife in 2021 doing mapping before and after bushfires, which then extended to thermal imaging and the request from Parks to build a drone that could light fires for back-burning.

"We built one with a 20l tank underneath that shoots out napalm," Andrew said.

Indicium Dynamics approached the Sheffield company based on this work.

The technology now being trialled involves a camera detecting smoke, a scout drone autonomously launching to verify fire then a larger drone sent to put out the fire when it is small.

"It's a global business model," said Andrew. "I was talking to defence the other day and they're thinking of setting it up at military training zones (to put out spot fires caused by artillery)."

Recent commitments from the G7 and other international bodies have recognised wildfire as a growing threat.

XPrize Wildfire Program Director Andrea Santy said wildfires were growing more frequent, more destructive and more costly.

"The status quo is no longer sustainable in a changing climate," she said. "The teams advancing to the next stages of XPrize Wildfire are showcasing the ingenuity we need not just to prepare for the future but to help shape it."

The 15 teams remaining in the XPrize Wildfire Challenge will be reduced to five with further testing in the US next year.

Terry will step down but remain on the committee, as long-term member Peter Morris takes over the presidency.

"With my workload as a councillor as well, I felt I'd given what I can give and it was time for a new person to take on the role and fill the job as he goes," Terry said.

With 43 members, including two from Tandara Aged Care, the

Men's Shed in Spring Street is an important headquarters for men to meet.

"It's that physical contact with each other," Terry said.
"Sometimes men don't talk to their partners about things that are bothering them and it's good to have someone to talk to about any problems, especially mental health and physical wellbeing."

As part of its men's health program, Rural Health visits the Shed monthly and conducts blood pressure checks, providing an early indicator of diabetes and cholesterol issues. "All the sheds in Tassie are now doing a similar thing," said Terry.

The Kentish Men's Shed's role in suicide prevention through its mateship program was recognised at the Tasmanian Life Awards earlier this year where the organisation was a finalist.

Incoming president Peter Morris said Terry had made a huge

Incoming president Peter Morris said Terry had made a huge impact on the Men's Shed, "not only for his leadership but for his genuine mentoring for every current and new member."

"They are big boots to fill," Peter said.

"Terry will still be a big part of the Men's Shed because of his local knowledge and contacts in the community. He will be a big help to me as I navigate the ins and outs of this huge organisation.

"I am very pleased and honored to have been elected as the new president and hope I can do the Men's Shed justice over the next year."

Projects undertaken by the Men's Shed, both paid and voluntary, create a pathway to mateship, with busy hands learning new skills and creating space for conversation.

The noticeboards in the Beulah Hall; shelving in the Kentish Museum, the direction pole at the Information Centre, a Diorama for Tas Hydro and the benchtop and table at Mural Park were all Kentish Men's Shed projects.

By far their biggest undertaking was relocating Bannon's Forge to Redwater Creek. "We put that together log by log," Terry said. A carriage rail restoration is the current large task.

"We're available to do projects, subject to the approval of the committee," said Terry. Members are also able to help with deceased estates where they go through tools, conduct safety checks, then sell them at a garage sale or pass them on.

Items made by members, such as bread saw and boards, laser puzzles, cheese boards, spatula and spoons, are available for sale.

Kentish Men's Shed in Spring Street is open Thursdays and Saturdays, 9am to 1pm.


John recalls many working bees at Tandara when it was still a hospital and many sessions chopping wood for fundraisers or to donate to those in need.

come along and admire the cars, and have the opportunity to vote for your favourite. No cost, just wander along after 10am





# Writer gets expert advice



The program is designed to nurture the next generation of literary talent in Tasmania and to link Tasmanian creators to professional development opportunities and national publishing networks.






Notice is given for the following application for a planning permit under section 57 of the Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993 (LUPA Act):

Tasmanian Networks Pty Ltd proposes use and development incorporating 366 new transmission towers, approximately 162km of new 220kV overhead transmission line within an easement varying in width between 50m to 120m; one new switching station; modifications to existing 110kV line and 22kV distribution lines; upgrades to the existing substations at Palmerston, Sheffield and Burnie; tracks to access towers from existing roadways; and temporary construction areas.

The proposal commences at Palmerston substation near the junction of Poatina Road and Saundridge Road and finishes at Hampshire Hills passing through Deloraine, Dunorlan, Sheffield, Barrington, Kindred, Abbotsham, Mount Montgomery, Blythe River, Heybridge, Burnie, East Cam and Highclere. The proposal crosses the Local Government areas of Northern Midlands, Meander Valley, Kentish, Central Coast and Burnie City.

Under the Commonwealth *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* (EPBC Act) the proposal was determined to be a controlled action. The relevant matters for assessment under the EPBC Act are listed threatened species and communities. The proposal is to be assessed as an accredited assessment under the *Major Infrastructure Development Approvals Act 1999* and the LUPA Act as part of this application.



# **BARRINGTON HALL AGM**

At the Kentish Garden Club's September meeting, Luke Bennett, Community

Preparedness Officer - North-West/North for the Tasmanian Fire Service, spoke to the group. He said now is the time to start thinking and preparing for the fire season ahead. Although Kentish has had good rainfall, there is always a threat of bushfire especially during a hot dry summer.

To prepare your property to make it safer, keep fence lines clear of growth (especially tall, dead grass), keep lawns mown but green, and clear gutters regularly. Remove fallen sticks and debris from the ground and move combustible material (including firewood) from near buildings.

Have cleared space around buildings especially in a highrisk bushfire zone. Also make sure there's good access to the property for fire engines. The fire brigade requires a four-metre square access, which means four metres in width and height so trim intruding or overgrowing branches. Vehicles also need space to turn around to safely leave the property.

Finally, the challenge from the Tasmanian Fire Service is to have a bushfire plan – regardless of where you live. Work out what you need to take with you in an emergency (such as phones, chargers, medications, and important items), how and where you can take pets and stock and where your nearby safer places are. Get started on your plan by taking the Bushfire-Ready Challenge at bushfire.tas.gov.au. Also download the TasALERT app for bushfire and other emergency alerts.

# Plant, trim, weed: this month's jobs list

How fast the year is going, we are in October already. My daffodils have just finished flowering. I planted 1000 bulbs three years ago, and each year they are getting a little thicker (*below right*). Later, when the tulip bulbs come up for sale, I will be ordering 1000 mixed colours (just no yellow).

I have a number of jobs I want to get done this month. The first is planting my Tahitian lime tree. "What about the frost?" you ask. Well, I picked up a large feed bag from a farmer (it would hold about a ton of feed when full).

Once the lime tree is planted, I will hammer in four star pickets, about 1.2m apart, so that when frost is expected I can place the bag over the tree to give it protection from the frost, until it becomes established.

I normally feed my Citrus in October so I can take advantage of the warmer weather. This will help with the uptake of fertilizers in the citrus trees.

Some years ago I planted a lot of Acacia melanoxylon, the black wattles. Some have grown quite tall, so to encourage them to grow taller the lower branches will be pruned to a height of 4m.

Of course, the one job that always pops its head up at this time of year is the weeds. I use an organic weed killer called Slasher. It can corrode your rubber seals in your spray unit, so make sure you wash the tank out well after use.

The Slasher will only kill seed germinated weeds, not those with bulbs or runners. For those I have a Japanese weeding knife, called a Hori Hori knife. This knife demands respect. The blade is about 15cm long and is seriously sharp with one side serrated. If you are cutting weeds with your right hand, you

need a good weeding glove on your left hand. It's brilliant for cutting through any tap roots without disturbing the soil and encouraging more weeds to grow.

The last job I would like to do is plant some snapdragons in the rose garden. Apart from looking pretty, they are great to show the dragon in the flower to the grandkids!

Happy Gardening.

# Fabric stitches up plastic by the bagful

Boomerang Bags Sheffield celebrated its sixth birthday on August 26.

The organisation was founded in 2013 by two young Queensland women who started a conversation about *plastic* and what they could do about the damage it was causing the environment. Be it overflowing landfills, floating in the oceans or strangling marine life.

Their answer was to create a platform to address the millions of plastic bags being used, the millions of tonnes of fabric waste created each year and the willingness and generosity of people from all fabrics of society to do something.

The initiative has spread around the world and the organisation witnessed groups coming together not only to save hundreds of thousands of plastic bags going to landfill but to share their own plastic stories, interact and

socialise with others and gain a sense of purpose in contributing to the local community.

Our own Boomerang Bags Sheffield was started by Lily Maddick, then only 19, with the help of Ann Ridgway, Veena Harvey, Cassandra Speed and Anna Maddick.

Lily saw the need to cut down on plastic waste and was inspired to provide re-usable free shopping bags for the Don Store, where she worked during her gap year. What started out with just a few old doona covers, we are now lucky enough to receive fabric from many generous community members, and The Hub is a great contributor. Donations of suitable fabrics, such as cotton and non-stretch fabric, including doona covers etc can be left at Sheffield School office.

The current group meets fortnightly for two hours on a Tuesday evening from 4.30-6.30pm, during the school term at the Sheffield School. Volunteers cut, iron and sew upcycled tote bags. The current record in an evening is 50! New volunteers are always welcome and be assured that you do not have to be a sewer to be of help.





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

# How the dream of Tasmania's AFLW/AFL teams turned into a political storm about a stadium

For years, Tasmanians dreamed of having AFL teams. That dream looked like a reality in 2023 when the AFL confirmed a licence. But a catch: no teams without a brand-new, roofed stadium at Macquarie Point, Hobart.

A moment of triumph soon spiralled into one of the state's most divisive political battles.

When the government declared the stadium project a "Project of State Significance", it bypassed normal planning processes. Supporters called it visionary; critics saw it as undemocratic.

Independent economists began running the numbers — with stark findings: every dollar invested would likely return less than half to the economy, the cost could blow out to more than \$1B. What started as a \$375M centrepiece looked like a billion-dollar vanity project.

Opposition wasn't just about money. The Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra warned that its performances, just 170m away, could be ruined by noise and vibration from stadium events.

Cultural leaders feared Hobart's heritage precinct would be permanently compromised. The RSL deplored the potential impact on Hobart's unique Cenotaph.

Grassroots groups like "No New Stadium" organised rallies, public meetings, petitions — arguing for funds for housing, health, schools, not corporate boxes. Throughout, polling showed around 60% of Tasmanians opposed the project.

The political fallout from the 2023 announcement was swift. Premier Rockliff's government was pushed into crisis in May 2023, a few days after a huge No Stadium rally, when two MPs resigned from the government. Amid continuing instability, an election was called in March 2024. The government couldn't secure a majority. Instability continued.

In June 2025 a no-confidence vote toppled the government. Another state election was called, just 16 months after the last.

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Again, no party secured a majority in the July 2025 election. And Labor went further backwards — from printing "No Stadium" stickers in 2023, they shifted position in 2024 (still unexplained), leaving many voters feeling unmoored, mystified.

The Greens and most of the independents worked to fill the void, to become the real Opposition. Their critical argument — never contested — was that budget repair required scrapping the stadium.

In September 2025 the proposal was deemed a failure on both cost and planning grounds when it was roundly rejected by the Tasmanian Planning Commission after 12 months of intensive scrutiny. The Premier immediately announced that he would again set aside expert findings, ploughing ahead regardless.

Tasmania is in a terrible bind. The AFL remains dogmatic — NO stadium, NO teams — but, on the ground, the project doesn't command public support. With Macquarie Point still untouched, the only realistic way forward is to renegotiate the deal. Otherwise, Tasmanians face losing their hard-won licence or austerity driven by debt crisis.

The stadium has become a symbol of competing visions for Tasmania's future. Does Tasmania gamble billions on a marquee venue, or double down on basic services, cultural life? If the AFL truly wants the game to thrive in Tasmania, will it meet the community halfway? The debate has fractured parties, mobilised communities, divided the state and forced the question — what kind of Tasmania do people want to build, not just for footy, but for generations to come?

# Spud farmers under threat from frozen imports

TasFarmers has slammed Woolworths' recent decision to import frozen potatoes from India, warning it undermines Australian farmers and risks consumer trust.

TasFarmers President Ian Sauer said the move leaves local growers furious after years of heavy investment in equipment, irrigation and infrastructure.

"Potatoes aren't a crop you can turn the tap on and off to; they take a five to eight year rotation and growers need certainty," Mr Sauer said. "Farmers have taken on big risks to supply the industry, and now they're being left in the lurch."

Mr Sauer said the decision shows the gap between supermarkets' glossy "supporting farmers" campaigns and their actions. "The recent inquiries into supermarket conduct should have been a wake-up call. Clearly, little has been learned."

TasFarmers has also criticised multinational processor Simplot for abandoning a long-standing fair model of supply negotiations with growers, while threatening to import potatoes from India or China if growers do not meet their reduced price offers for locally grown potatoes.

"This stacks the deck in favour of processors and pushes farmers backwards. It's disappointing, a return to a 1950s master-servant culture that does nothing for agriculture or consumers," Mr Sauer said.

"Tasmania and Australia have some of the most highly regulated agriculture in the world. Locally grown food is safe, clean and produced to the highest standards.

"Supermarkets must live up to their commitments to back local producers, and processors must return to fair and transparent negotiations."

TasFarmers' negotiating committee continues to represent Tasmanian producers and ensure their concerns are heard at the highest levels.





# Hydro finds housing for workers at Daisy Dell

Hydro Tasmania is progressing plans for housing a future workforce for the proposed Cethana pumped hydro project.

Cethana is one part of the renewable energy solution that will help deliver secure, reliable electricity in Tasmania for generations to come.

This project will create hundreds of jobs during construction, potentially up to 350.

To support this workforce, Hydro Tasmania has found a site in Middlesex, known locally as Daisy Dell, for a temporary Workforce Accommodation Facility.

The site has advantages of being less than 10-minute drive to site, suitable size and flat terrain, potential to minimise visual impact and easy access off Cradle Mountain Road.


Hydro Tasmania is seeking land within a 30-minute radius of the project site to reduce travel times and manage fatigue for the safety of the workforce.

"Shorter commutes also means that we can more effectively manage construction traffic between the accommodation village and the construction site," said a spokesperson.

The team at Hydro Tasmania has been out talking to locals and thanks those in the community who have shared their feedback.

Hydro Tasmania is also carrying out a range of technical assessments to better understand and manage potential impacts. The findings will be shared as part of the WAF Development Application submitted to Kentish Council. The community will have the opportunity to comment on the proposal when it goes on public exhibition.

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### **ENVIRONMENTAL CORNER**

Scientists have recently tracked an eagle that flew from South Africa to Finland. Remarkably, it only deviated once in a slight curvature from an almost straight line to reach a feeding area in the southern Caucasus.

How did this bird know how to get from one part of our planet to another?

For those of you who take an interest in ecology, it might prove correct to suggest it is something to do with the stars or the Earth's magnetism. The question from a scientific observation is, how to prove it?

To make things even more difficult, how about tracking a Bogong Moth from South East Queensland and Western Victoria to hibernate in a cave in the Australian Alps?

You can't stick a camera on the head of a moth, nor can you place a wireless antenna. This flight by tens of thousands of these moths is for them a 1000-kilometer journey equivalent to a human circumnavigating the Earth twice!

To answer this intriguing question, scientists first captured a few Bogong moths and put them through a series of tests in a laboratory situation to observe their behaviour.

First, they put moths in a special flight arena with magnetic coils, together with a mock-up of the starry sky. By using the coils, it removed any form of magnetism.

To the amazement of the onlookers, the moths could still work out their migratory direction simply by using the stars!

Next, the scientists tried to trick the moths by turning the

projected sky 180°; as expected, they flew in the opposite direction. Yet if the

stars on the roof of the arena were mixed up, the moths became

In another experiment, the moths were taken on a hill outside and under a dome on a cloudy night and could still locate their magnetic direction without the aid of stars.

So, you may well ask, what does this prove? The insects can use two forms of a compass, the Earth's magnetic field and the stellar (stars), to navigate. If one form of navigation fails, there is another.

This ability for the Bogong Moth to travel such a great distance and with such accuracy is even more remarkable when considering its brain, which measures 2.54mm or 1/10 the volume of a grain of rice, and its eyes are only a couple of millimeters wide.

And this is the only invertebrate (does not have a backbone) to date that can navigate this way to find direction relative to north. The only known living species to be able to do this are night-migratory birds and human beings!

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# The chequered history of Mt Clau

Just as the Minnow River gold rush of 1878–1880 was tapering off, two Railton prospectors – **Henry Weeks** and **Thomas Shepherd** – reported a silver-lead strike at **Round Hill** on the western extremity of **Mt Claude** range. In 1881, this ignited another local prospecting frenzy. They came from everywhere, fossicking the hills and pegging out their claims. The enterprising **Grace Pease** (widow of **Peter Pease**), who had lived at 'Holly Hill' on Lockwoods Rd for 20 years, began advertising 'accommodation at reasonable rates, with good stabling and paddocks for horses.' She commenced supplying the prospectors/miners with bread, meat, butter, eggs, etc. Among these new Mt Claude prospectors were several discouraged leaseholders from the Minnow goldfields. This new discovery commenced the very chequered 'off again/on again' mining history around Mt Claude.

### Mt Claude Silver Lead Mining Co 1881–1884

Samples of silver-lead ore taken from Claude Creek gorge tested in Launceston proved so promising that a meeting held at John Sampson's Retreat Inn in Latrobe led to the formation of the Mount Claude Silver-Lead Mining Company on 8 August 1881. Daniel Burke of Westbury was appointed provisional manager, Rob Bauld secretary, Thomas Hainsworth treasurer, with John Sampson, A Mitchell, A Cherry and Henry Weeks provisional directors. Shareholders were businessmen and influential people from Latrobe to Launceston. The company selected two claims covering Round Hill and the Claude Creek gorge. James Hancock, who had wide experience in the UK and at Mount Bischoff, was appointed mine manager. Commencing in Sep 1881 with 12 men, Hancock's first task was to cut access tracks around the very steep sides of Claude Creek gorge to get tools and equipment into tunnelling sites. Lots of rock blasting was undertaken by Joshua Winter of Railton to construct a 11/4-mile-long wooden tramway around the precipitous hills to get the ore carried in horse-drawn wagons out to the crushing mill. Five acres of level land was chosen out on the front-side of Mt Claude to build the crushing mill, company offices and miners' huts; the same site where, 35 years later, another mining company erected their township of Cethana. Six months after James Hancock became manager, he was dismissed for being absent from the mine over Christmas, not keeping correct accounts and for abusive language towards the directors. Stephen Hocking, a previous employee, was appointed as the new manager.

At a Mount Claude Company meeting held in Jan 1883, shareholders were told that the tramway into the mine had been completed at a cost of £800. That year, prominent company executive **Thomas Hainsworth** of Latrobe, a huge Cornishman, had a narrow escape from drowning while returning from a visit to the mine. Having entered the Dasher River on horseback, he was attempting to climb up the steep bank on the other side when his horse lost its footing and fell backward, plunging him beneath the water. His companion came to the rescue, but his horse sprang over Hainsworth, cutting his face with its hooves and submerging him again down into the murky depths of the river. The operations of Mt Claude Silver Lead Mining Co 'were not attended with success', and in 1884 the mine was abandoned. Over its five-year lifespan, the Mount Claude Company had spent more than £5000 and produced less than 20 tons of ore.

Tasmanian Silver & Lead Mining Company 1881–1882 Sheffield's first storekeeper, Robert Manley, was another disappointed lessee at the Minnow goldfield who had moved onto Mt Claude. With his Latrobe hotel mates **Frank Young**, **Wm Collard** and others, they formed Latrobe Silver-Lead Company and began mining 800 yards to the northwest of the old Mount Claude Co property. Robert Manley took a large quantity of their mineral specimens down to Hobart with the aim of joining a couple of other mining ventures to form one strong Tasmanian company. Manley was successful, and by October 1881, the new Tasmanian Silver & Lead Mining Company had been floated in Hobart, giving them more investment money. However, deep disappointment followed when their lodes fizzled out and a lot of money was lost.

### **Mount Roland Silver-Lead Co 1881**

Following the mineral discovery at Mt Claude, the directors of **River Don Co** purchased all the Dasher River flats from Claude Road to Gowrie and took out several mineral leases at the eastern end of Mt Roland. The Don Company had just opened a wooden tramway from Don up to Lower Barrington and now planned to continue it to Sheffield and out to their mining site at Claude Road. But though the mine was initially worked day and night shifts for some months, eventually they closed the whole thing down. Today, this mine is part of the attraction of staying at Silverwood Retreat up Rysavy Rd.

### Southern Cross Pty SM Company, Mt Claude, 1891–1892

Early in 1891, the Southern Cross Proprietary Silver Mining Co was floated in Melbourne to work the leases of the old Mount Claude Company. Commencing Dec 1891, they extended one tunnel by 198 yards, hoping to find a new lode. The only thing found was a strong flow of water. By July 1892, the company was in financial difficulty, and their mining efforts were abandoned. The company assets were seized and auctioned off.

### Kentish Pty Silver-Mining Company 1892-1893

George Hartrick from Melbourne, a former adviser/manager of the above Southern Cross Co, seriously believed they had been within a few yards of discovering a valuable lode of silver. At the auction, Hartrick purchased the mine's entire assets and, in Sept 1892, persuaded Sheffield locals to buy shares in his Kentish Pty Silver-Mining Co to take over the lease of the Southern Cross site. All directors were from Sheffield: RR Roberts (Australasian Bank), Chris Spotswood (National Bank), JT Wilson (Sheffield Hotel), Elvin Atkinson (coach proprietor) & George Cruikshank (drapery manager). Largest Sheffield shareholders: John T Wilson (1,875 shares) and Thomas J Clerke (760 shares). Others: RR Roberts, Chris Spotswood, James York, A & S York, Constable John Burns, Elvin Atkinson, Geo Cruikshank, Robert Manning, Mrs Alice White, Mrs Mary McNamee, Miss Alice Wilson, James Manning, Malcolm Campbell & George Day. By the end of 1893, the tunnel had advanced 46m but no lode. When the silver price crash of August 1893 happened, it put an end to all investment interest in silver-lead mining for well over a decade.

### Round Hill Silver & Lead Mining Company (1907–1927)

After Llewellyn Thomas's prospecting party discovered some fine specimens within the 200-acre site of old Mount Claude Co mine, the Round Hill Silver & Lead Mining Co was formed in Devonport in April 1907. It was the most successful mining company on this site and lasted 20 years. Most shareholders came from Devonport, Launceston and Melbourne, with Wm Innes (chairman), Captain Holyman and Hector McFie (directors). Underground mines were opened on both

sides of the Claude Creek gorge, with an aerial steel cableway to carry the ore buckets across the gully. The rock crusher machine, manufactured by Finlayson Bros Engineering Works, Devonport, took **Wm Davies** three days to haul it behind his traction engine to the Round Hill mill site. **Dan Davies**, delivering cut timber for the manager's house along the narrow tramway track, lost his horse and loaded wagon over the side of the precipice. The wagon snagged on rocks 80ft below, but his horse fell a further 100ft into the bottom of the gorge.

In just under two years, the Round Hill Mining Co spent £1,746 to get the mine operational so that in March 1909 Wm Davies could cart the first 25-tons of ore to Railton for rail to Devonport and trans-shipment to smelters in NSW. For three months, the mines and mill worked well, despatching 20 tons of ore weekly to the Railton Railway Station.

# The opening of the Roland-Railton railway line was cause for jubilation

Then in mid-June 1909 came a significant drop in world metal prices. The company could barely cover costs, and shareholders became nervous about ever receiving a dividend. In Nov 1909, the directors closed the mine and didn't reopen it until metal prices began to rise in May 1911. Production progressively increased, and the company was now operating profitably – ready to pay off all its debt. Carting bags of ore over bad roads during winter months was very costly, so the opening of the Railton–Roland railway line in Nov 1914, bringing the train terminus to within eight miles of the mine, was cause for jubilation.

In 1915, the discovery of new lodes of high-grade ore at Round Hill was the catalyst for the mining company to benefit from the sale of £10,000-worth of shares to the **Hon Frank Bond** MLC and his investor friends in Hobart, who had been keenly watching the company's development. With this large injection of funds, they appointed **John Craze**, with wide management experience on the West Coast, as the new general manager and began to greatly enlarge the mill's capacity from 25 tons to 150 tons of ore per day. An 8ft-wide bridge was constructed across the Claude Creek gorge, upon which was temporarily stored a partly installed engine, machinery parts and a boiler.

Unexpectedly, in Dec 1916, a disastrous flood severely damaged the half-renovated mill and washed the engine and machinery off the bridge into the creek below. Fortunately, most of the engine was retrieved from the creek, but, despite dredging efforts, some smaller parts were not recovered, and spares had to be sought. This event was the likely reason for Claude Creek being renamed 'Machinery Creek'.

The period through 1918 to 1920 proved very satisfactory for the company. Under the wise management of John Craze, the increased production of the plant along with a sharp rise in the silver price all pointed to success at last. For something like 30 years, this mine site struggled for survival, reaching death's door several times, but in this post-WWI period, it ranked as the richest mine in the state.

About 40 men were employed at the mine, many of them coming from nearby Kentish farms. They included **Ern Eagling, John McCoy, Geo Dunn, Bill Knowles, Perc Cox and John McCorey**, whose two-year-old daughter Sylvia fell

into the water-race and drowned. Others were Betts, Storey, Elliott, Foley, Davis, Campbell and the Carey, Crawley & Humphrey brothers. The underground miners - wearing helmets with candles attached - worked eight hours, while above-grounders worked nine hours on a 5½-day week roster. Despite the hazards of underground blasting, horses pulled the ore-filled wagons out of tunnels and along the tram tracks to the crushing plant. The crushed silver-lead ore was placed in 1-cwt bags and carted in 3-ton wagonloads by one of the two fivehorse teams to Roland Railway Terminus. Carters included Sam Pointon, Ted Blake, Les Day, Maurie Byard and Reg Byard. In 1920, Cethana had become a healthy little township on the northern slopes of Mt Claude. John & Elsie Rogers had taken over its boarding house and local store. Life was not easy for Elsie Rogers. Up at 4am, she had to feed the first shift of single men with breakfast, cut their lunches and later prepare their evening meal. Each miner paid her £1 each week. A new state school opened in Feb 1920 with Miss Roberton in charge of

The first church service in Cethana was conducted by Sheffield's new Presbyterian minister **Rev John Higginbotham** in May 1920. Cethana PO commenced in the Round Hill Silver & Lead Mining Company's office, but in 1922, the mill manager, **Stan (Bill) Hetherington**, had his wife, **Muriel** (née Mainwaring), joined him at Cethana to run the Post Office/telephone and bank agency. Dan Davies had the mail contract. **John Jackson** of the Roland general store delivered groceries in his Model T Ford.

over 20 children.

A fire at the mine in Oct 1920 destroyed the compressor building and did other damage. In May 1921, the directors considered paying out the first ever dividend when another sharp drop in metal prices forced them to suspend mining operations for five months until prices improved in October 1921. Popular mine manager John Craze used this break to retire to his substantial home Montana, High St, Sheffield, where he maintained a high profile.

A fatal accident occurred in the Round Hill mill in Feb 1926 when **Doug Mainwaring** (19) was pulled by belts into the machinery, resulting in several mangled bones before it could be stopped. The make-shift mine ambulance paused at the Cethana PO so Doug could speak to his postmistress sister, Muriel Hetherington. His last words to her were: 'It ain't gonna rain anymore.' Doug died that night in Latrobe Hospital and was buried in the Claude Rd cemetery. The courts awarded £200 to be paid to his mother.

Continued low silver-lead prices throughout the 1920s caused the company to operate at a loss. So, early in 1927, the company directors closed the mine. The Cethana PO closed in Dec 1927, and Cethana school closed in May 1930 but reopened in Feb 1931 as a small, subsidised school for over a decade. In 1946, **Wm French** of Barrington hauled the building to the Wilmot school. Between 1948 and 1951, nine Sheffield residents, including **Alf Rowe** and **Ray Parker**, formed the West Mount Claude Mining Syndicate to operate a small mill that processed about 20 tons of ore.

Although the mining fever that led to the opening of the Mt Claude mines has long since dissipated, in Sheffield, our two most elegant and impressive two-storey buildings are the Sheffield Hotel and York, Schmidt & Co. Both were built in 1883 by incredibly over-optimistic mining investors; today they still serve as magnificent memorials to Mt Claude's glory days.

As a few of the Railton sign plants had died, so we made the decision to cut out the dead plants and planted a few new

ones, kindly donated by the Railton Neighbourhood Centre.

Nearer the corner, we have roses surrounded by sea serpents.

Along further, we are slowly re-cutting the sea monsters into a giant caterpillar. Unfortunately in the two years when the topiary was left alone, a lot of the larger topiaries had grown out and we were unable to re-cut the original figures.

This has also happened to the Tassie Devil topiary near the bridge, which at one point was mistaken for a wombat because it had grown out so much.

The Bullock topiary near the corner shop has also grown out over half a meter from its original frame like the devil.

The Lion topiary at the corner has also grown larger and the post man outside Railton Post Office is much taller.

The topiary growing season starts about October and November with fortnightly cuts, then weekly cuts from December to March, then back to fortnightly for April, May, June, to maintain the proper size of each topiary.

We're on holidays from July until the end of September.
