# WHO IS K.E.E.N.E.R ?

K.E.E.N.E.R. inc (Kentish Energy Efficiency Network Embracing Renewables) formed in 2009 as a focus group for concerned community members who wanted a sustainable future for the Kentish municipality. The first choice of name was "Alternative Living Integrated Energy Network", but we thought a bunch of people who called themselves "ALIENS" might not be taken too seriously! Primarily focused on information exchange, the group has engaged the wider community on energy efficiency measures and renewable energy technologies through presentations, workshops and film nights.

The group was also instrumental in facilitating some domestic solar power and solar hot water installation projects, both in Kentish as well as across the north of Tasmania. It is estimated that the solar hot water project alone has potentially reduced greenhouse gas emissions by 100 tonnes CO<sup>2</sup>-e. Not bad going for a handful of volunteers!

Some of this work was recognised through K.E.E.N.E.R inc being named as one of the finalists in the 2011 Community Achievement awards.

# VALE - JOHN DYER

On May 22, 2013 Sheffield and the Kentish Municipality lost a wonderful man.

John Dyer was in his garden when he suffered a heart attack.

He was one of a kind and a most respected member of the local community.

John always had time to talk to anyone who needed help or guidance and always put his beloved community at the front of his attention.

There was not one person in the community that was not shocked and saddened by his sudden passing.

The number of mourners at his memorial service says it all about how much he was loved and respected by everyone from all walks of life.

Our deepest sympathies go to his family wife Cindy, and children Ellen, Samuel and Caleb.

The following is about John's life as told by Des Brown.

John Dyer was a Godly man, family man, action man, and community man being a man of his word.

John in his early teens wanted to be a farmer this desire was further enhanced at every opportunity on Bruce and Bev Duffs property. On one occasion when things were going wrong with cows and calves going in all directions, not through the gate John suggested it was time to pray.

This lad from the town with Beatle like hairstyle brought his personal beliefs, values, enthusiasm and passion to the farm when he came to do an apprenticeship with me. If you thought the Beatles had energy on stage that was nothing compared to the movement of John around the farm.

In a short time John was taking the country perfumes

of delight to the house of Dyer, not roses or violets this brought forward his welcome home every night from the kitchen lounge room to the back door, clothes off to the laundry, John to the shower.

I cannot recall John ever being late, taking a sickie or not applying himself less than 110% to any job.

Even digging a drain with a spade and shovel in swamp then going home to declare to his dad he would rather be doing this than working in his shop.

John played his part in building one of the first rotary dairies in this State. He would

have Turner Trading proud with the skills he showed. He took the mundane job of washing cow muck out of the dairy yards and turn it into a glamorous affair with the help of a 20 H.P. motor, wash down pump with a 50mm flat hose and nozzle. He established a time of washing the yard out of under four minutes then seeking to lower it every time. Everyone then tried to lower the time and as it got lower by the seconds John always got the record back.

John had a dream to train a work dog. When on our way to a property near the golf course we would be chased by dogs as we drove past a particular property road entrance and I would declare, "those dogs have no brains". A short time later John chose a black kelpie boy pup from a litter of theirs and named him Joe.

John said he would take a biblical principle for children and apply it to his dog. "Train up a child in the way it should go and it will not depart from it". Then nearly all lunchtime was spent in training the dog. Then one

day John declared Joe would be going to church to be in a demonstration in a children's talk that he was giving about servant, Master relationship. John went well but Joe was better according to the dog.

The love and attention that John gave this dog with "no brains" resulted in a special dog with it's eyes showing it's love from it's heart to it's master and prepared to serve at any time regardless of how it felt. Two words sum up the life of Joe to his Master, love and sacrifice.

Those same two words love and sacrifice sum up John Dyer's journey of life in his relationship to God, to his family, to the community, to his friends.

He was not a religious man or a man of words only but put into action his faith in God through love.

His love of Kentish and its people was demonstrated in many ways mentoring to those that sought guidance, his support of the Mural projects, going to Nevada at his own expense in a bid to bring the 2008 Global Conference to Sheffield, the Muralfest support and development ever since it started.

He played a leading role in giving this Community hope in a time of despair through love to it and sacrificial giving of time and money.

The Cradle Coast Award of 2012 for outstanding contribution by an individual to tourism was a token recognition of his achievements. He never sought awards but considered it a privilege to serve.

He has left a legacy with vision, opportunity to grasp, challenge to accept, and a choice to be made.

I say let us take the opportunity; accept the challenge to do it together to build a better future for the generations to come.

A quote by John Wesley sums up the life of John Dyer. "Do all the good you can. By all the means you can. In all ways you can. In all places you can. At all the times you can. To all people you can. As long as ever you can." **Des Brown.**

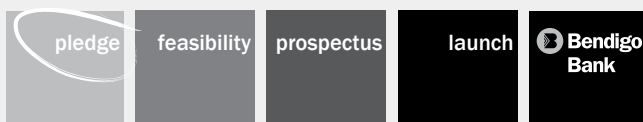

# KENTISH COUNCIL TO SHARE IN OVER \$1.4 MILLION FOR LOCAL INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

Kentish Council will share in almost \$1.5 million in Federal Government funding to help build and renew community infrastructure, according to a recent media release by Federal Member for Lyons Dick Adams.

This funding to local councils is through the Regional Development Fund and the Liveable Cities Program. Under this latest round Kentish Council is eligible to receive \$135,285, however it will need to outline the projects Council intends to put this funding towards in order to receive it.

“Councils can use these funds to build and renew community infrastructure such as sporting facilities, libraries, town halls and playgrounds. This investment may also be of benefit to essential community services such as child care facilities”, Mr Adams said. “This Federal funding boost will allow our councils to start on ‘shovel ready’ projects, generating new economic activity as soon as possible.”

As Councils have to submit applications by 22nd July, any community group that has some ideas about how this might be spent in Kentish (particularly if their ideas are ‘shovel ready’), then now is the time to lobby Council. For example, installing solar panels on all community halls would be infrastructure that would reduce the energy costs for Community Halls while also supporting the environment through more renewable energy. But, if you have some better ideas, don’t keep them to yourself – tell your local Councillor or write to Council.

## Electric Eddy’s power bill busting tips



### Lids On = Less Power

Just as putting a hat on in winter helps to keep you warmer, putting a lid on your pan does the same thing for *its* contents.

With the lid on the pan, water boils quicker because the steam stays in the pan and so too does all the heat that would have escaped with the steam otherwise. And, once the water is boiling, you can turn down the heat on the stove much lower in order to keep it at boiling point. So your boiled eggs, boil in the bag, boiled rabbit or boiled whatever will be cooked with about 10% to 15% less electricity (or gas) than it would have if it was cooked uncovered.

The other bonus, is that with lids on, it doesn’t fill your house with steam which ultimately fogs up your windows and gives you more work to do in wiping windowsills in winter!


Next month – **Double Glazing** – cheapest way to double glaze.

# POLICE REPORT

The winter is here again and so far it has been a brisk start to some mornings with temperatures well into the sub-zero category in some areas. With this has seen the formation of ice on parts of the road – including the main street of Sheffield. This changed road condition is extremely dangerous and drivers need to adjust accordingly. Leave a bit earlier and slow down your destination is still going to be there no matter how long it takes.

Recent events in the Kentish area include a crash occurring involving a horse. This is a reminder to all drivers that there is a wide range of road users from trucks, motorcyclists, cyclists, pedestrians and horse riders. All have the right to be on the road network and all should be acting responsibly and safely to avoid any situation that places particular road users at risk.

If you see a rider or pedestrian up ahead on one of our many country roads, slow down, assume that there may be more than one until

otherwise determined, and treat them with the courtesy they deserve. At the same time those pedestrians and riders should be making every effort to be seen. Wear bright or high visibility clothing. Have a torch and a reflective vest if out in light reduced conditions.

The crime in the Kentish area has again remained low with a few break-ins. Of note was a number of break-ins that occurred in the Moina area around the lakes.

A number of dwellings were accessed and items stolen where police believe that the offenders came in via boat. This is a reminder to all that we need to look after our neighbours especially in isolated areas. We can be proactive in the community and report suspicious activity to police or crime stoppers.

# The Goode Life

After a tree change from city life to a bush block in Kentish, the pace of life changed as the routines of rural life enforced new strategies for living a downsized lifestyle.

Gone was the hustle and bustle, the commute, the cheek by jowl in a train with strangers. In its place came the space, the air, the neighbours, pot luck dinners and calloused hands!

New skills came thick and fast as we embraced our new environment. First trick was the backwards long jump for which I could have got “gold” after discovering what I thought was a snake when lifting a log. It turned out to be a blue tongued lizard, but hey – react first and live longer is my motto!

I suppose the furry critters and wee beasties were the things that I noticed most in comparison to my previous urban back yard. As we had several dams and a river running through the property, I was especially looking forward to spotting a platypus. It only took a couple of years for this to happen, but then they tend to favour the 5am slot for their frolics in the open, which is far earlier than I frolic out of bed!

Possums, however, were very evident from the word go. I think they’ve either developed rubber soled feet



to get past the electric fence or they’re abseiling down the wire from the pole. Either way, they persistently chomp the foliage from the fruit trees, breaking branches as they go. And if any fruit do manage to set, you can bet your bottom dollar that the currawongs or crows will arrive the day before you had planned on picking it and beat you to the crop.

On the domestic front, we thought some sheep to keep down the grass and a few chooks and geese for eggs would be a good idea. That started a whole new learning curve. We started with a wether of unknown breed and after discovering the delights of “getting it sheared”, changed tack to Wiltshires which shed their wool and saved us the bother. We tried not to, but they still acquired labels – so Missy and Little’un both grew up and grew old in the paddock and we bought someone else’s lamb from the abattoir.

The chooks were a delight and a constant source of amusement. They had their own secure pen to keep them safe at night from devils and quolls, but getting them there if they weren’t quite ready to go took guile and cunning. If you tried to make them go in, they would either run off in the opposite direction or you would get the “elbows out” stance and stamping feet. Actually, that was the easiest to deal with, because once you’d finished laughing you could just pick them up and carry them. But, if they ran off, they were a devil to catch up with and it took sneaky tactics involving bribes of chook pellets to attract their interest.

# HORSE/RIDER ROAD SAFETY?

When the public gallery for a Council meeting is packed full to bursting, you know that there is going to be a big issue raised in public question time.

Kelli Parker from Nook, who had recently been in a road traffic accident that caused the death of her horse, made a reasoned and passionate plea to Council for some road signage to be erected to warn road users that horses and riders also use Kentish roads.

This message was reinforced by other members of the gallery, who shared some of their own concerns and frightening experiences even on back roads in Kentish.

Highlighted was the fact that Kentish has several major horse riding events, such as the "Tom Quilty" which attracted interstate riders and tourists. Also, that the Tasmanian Trail runs through Kentish, the majority of which is off-road but at some points uses or crosses sealed roads.

The message spelled out for Council was summed up by the question "we're a rural area – why can't we get signage to warn road users of horses?" In response, Council's General Manager, Gerald Monson referred the issue to Council's Road Safety Committee and also agreed to meet with Ms Parker to discuss the

issues that she had raised.

It is interesting to note that in the Community Directory published by Council there are 7 Kentish businesses listed which are focused on horses or horse riding, as well as 3 clubs and 3 regular events.

This tends to suggest that there are likely to be quite a few horses in Kentish. What is your view on this issue?

Do you think that visitors should be warned with road signage when they cross the borders of Kentish – after all, they may be driving a rental vehicle on a different side of the road to what they are used to, as well as being a "rubber neck"?

Do you think that the Tasmanian Road Rules should include rules relating to horses and riders? Have you any other comments on this issue – write to the Editor or contact the Road Safety Committee at Kentish Council as they are the ones who will make any recommendations on the matter.

# LOCAL LANDCARE IN SPOTLIGHT

Local rivercare group, Mt Roland Rivercare Catchment Inc had the opportunity to show off some of its weed control projects this month.

Delegates attending a Landcare Tasmania meeting at Gowrie Park were shown the main weed hotspot at the heart of what was once a hydro village.

Rivercare committee members, Greg Taylor and Petra Wilden described the weed mapping and control work that had been done so far around the perimeter of the main infestation at Gowrie Park.

They also pointed out a weed that even the seasoned landcarers from Landcare Tasmania missed due to it appearing like many tea tree species.

Kunzea Ericoides is not native to Tasmania but with its tiny dust like seed and its exploding seedpod mechanism has the potential to spread prolifically.

It is often not noticed because it is assumed to be a native species, according to Greg.

This weed was reported by fellow committee member Clive Bott and later verified by the Tasmanian Herbarium.

Not to be confused with the Tasmanian native Kunzea Ambigua, Kunzea Ericoides is regarded as an invasive species that rapidly colonises disturbed areas.

Weeds can cost landowners significantly, as they may degrade the land's ability to support primary production.

Weeds also impact on natural reserves and threaten some of our tourism icons.

Mt Roland is one such icon under threat from weed escapees from Gowrie Park, which has now become a hotspot for several Weeds of National Significance and other declared weeds.

Spanish Heath in particular has shown its ability to travel, spreading along road verges at an alarming rate from seeds spread by cars and roadside slashing. All of this probably started from the past gardens of the old Hydro village but now it's "gone feral"!

# CLAUDE ROAD MARKET – 25TH YEAR



Four times a year Claude Road Hall buzzes with enterprise as it fills with stalls for the quarterly Claude Road Market. Now in its 25th year, the volunteer run market is as much a social highlight in the local community as it is a chance to buy or sell goods.

The ladies in the kitchen are renowned for their cakes and slices and there is a constant stream of people willing to keep checking that they are up to their usual standard each time! Edith, Kim, Jude, Riza and Lee were flat-out at the June market serving breakfasts, lunches and morning teas to appreciative customers. When you can get yummy home cooked lasagne for \$5 or a cup of tea and a magnificent cup cake or slice for just \$3, the food is not only good but good value too.

It may not always be a large market, but it is known locally as the friendly market. Regular stall holders sell hand-made greetings cards, cakes, jams, chutneys, hand crafted wooden items, fruit and veg, plants, clothes, as well as general bric-a-brac, toys, books and whatever else has been cleared out of the garage that week. Anne and Dot have had a stall at the market since 2007 selling beautifully crafted greetings cards that they make themselves. "We stopped on the off-chance once and have been coming back ever since" says Anne. "We like it, it's very friendly and the kitchen's good which means we don't have to bring our own food" adds Dot.

A common theme that brings people back each time is the chance to catch up with neighbours, have a yarn over a cuppa and to check what's going on in the district. Everyone goes home with something they hadn't planned to buy, and usually having eaten a lot more than they'd planned to eat as well.

The markets are held on the 3rd Saturday of March, June, September and December, with the Christmas market being just a bit more glitzy with festive decorations and plenty of yuletide fare. The opening times are 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

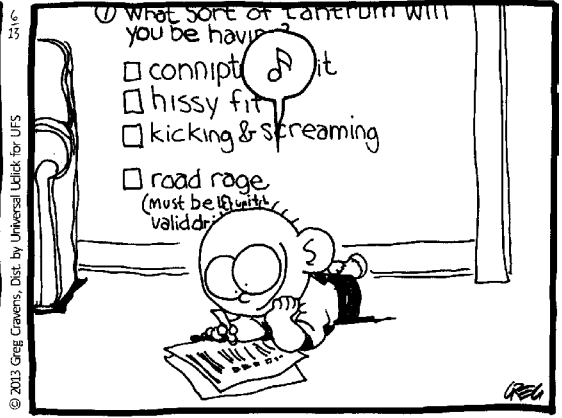
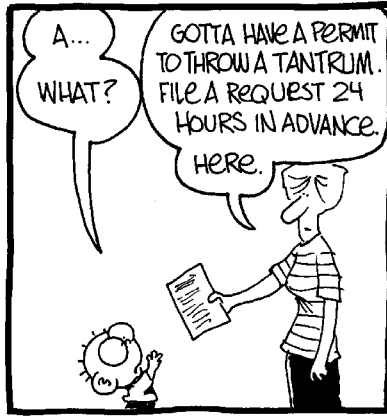


